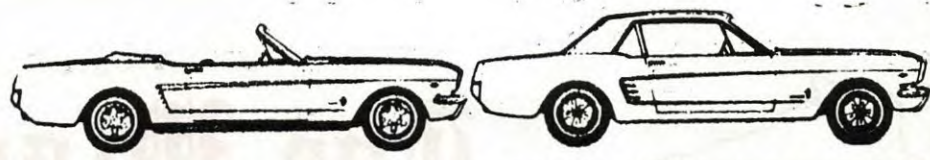

FEBRUARY CAR OF THE MONTH: 1967 FASTBACK OWNER: DICK COYLE

My car spent it's early years on the west coast. I found ticket stubs dated 1968 from an outdoor theater in San Bernadino Ca. hidden under the back seat. The car was traded to Don Boyer Chevrolet in Oak Harbor Washington on March 15th 1976 by a naval officer stationed in San Francisco Ca. It was sold two weeks later to a Rockford Ill. man who was in the army stationed in Washington. The list price was \$950, but sold for \$550. The car had been painted yellow over the original whimbleton white. The ivy interior was sprayed black. In 1978 the car was purchased by a Janesville, Wi. man for \$3800, who had the car repainted to it's present color, an off white. In 1980 the car was bought by a Fort Atkinson, Wi. man who owned it until I bought it in 1981.

The retoration history is as follows:

The interior was completely redone in 1981. New two tone ivy green upholsty, new headliner, and carpet. All panels and doors refinished including dash and dash panels. The engine was completely rebuilt by Dick Doria in 1982. This included 351W heads, Crane cam, Edelbrock intake with 600cfm Holly and Cloys roller timing chain. New style steel wheels with B.F. Goodrich TA radials installed in 1984.

A complete front end rebuild was finished in 1986 This included new upper and lower a-arms, springs and rebuilt power steering unit.

Other features include:

Automatic trans, Power steering, Exterior decor group, Rear fold down seat, Woodgrain steering wheel, Bench seat with arm rest, GT fog lights, Aluminium tail light grille, Two tone ivy green interior, Style steel wheels. V.I.N. 7R02A21274. I anticipate having the car completely stripped and repainted to the original color.

IMPORTANT DATES

IN AUTOMOBILE HISTORY

- 1897- The first Oldsmobile was produced.
- 1901- First American car to be manufactured in quantity was the Oldsmobile Runabout.
- 1904- The first car to break the 100 mph barrier, its engine was four feet long and three and a half feet high "would you believe it was a four cylinder."
- 1914- The first U.S. car to produce a water cooled V8 engine was Cadillac.
- 1924- Four wheel brakes appeared on Buicks.
- 1926- Shatter resistant safety glass.
- 1928- Synchromesh transmission was introduced.
- 1939- Hydra-matic was introduced and was on 1940 models.
- 1953- 12-volt electrical systems developed by Delco Remy Division.
- 1955- Buick and Oldsmobile offered the first four-door hardtop sedans.
- 1959- GM introduced smaller cars — Buick Special, Olds F-85 and the Pontiac Tempest.
- 1961- The first American V6 engine.
- 1963- A new car was introduced by Chevrolet called Chevelle.
- 1967- Pontiac introduced a new car called Firebird.

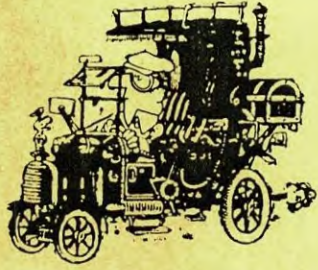

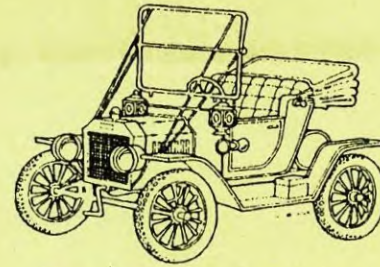
