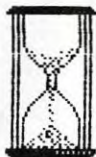

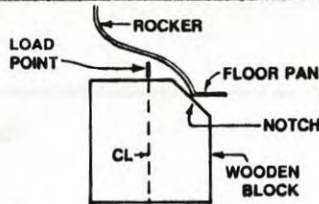
BETTER IDEA OF THE MONTH

This is a simple remedy that I stumbled onto after many vain efforts to free-up a sticking valve lifter in my '65 four-barrel 289. After engine warm-up, remove the valve cover over the offending lifter. With the engine idling, using regular engine oil, squirt copious amounts of oil into the top recesses of the rocker arm over the lifter in question (through the oil hole in the rocker arm) This will probably silence the sticking lifter since you have supplied the needed oil normally supplied by the pumping action of both the lifter and the oil pump. With the engine still running, cycle the valve adjustment nut from very loose (audible tapping) to normal adjustment (1/2-turn after silence). With the engine still running, observe the oil supply on top of the rocker arm is maintained by the pumping action of the lifter. If so, the problem may be corrected. Repeat this procedure several times with both the oil squirting and adjustment nut.

This offending lifter can always be found by the absence of oil on top of the rocker arm and/or a dry push rod. It can also be located by placing a finger on top of the rocker arm adjustment stud. The sticking lifter will be felt tapping through the stud. If this procedure fails to work, all it has cost you is a little fun time with your Mustang. If it does work, it has saved you an expensive lifter replacement job.

Better Ideas



Some of us budget minded folks can't see spending \$50 to \$100 for a full set of jack stands. Even some of the premium sets have an eight-inch square footing and can even rock over. They just don't look safe.

An inexpensive and safer alternative is to cut cedar or hardwood blocks of equal lengths. Use a 12-inch diameter or larger block for safety. Place the load point in the center of the block and notch the block to clear the floorpans. Don't worry about the blocks splitting or that the block might not support the weight of the car. Here in South Carolina, houses were once built on cedar blocks right on top of the ground.

Better Idea Of The Month

Not long ago, I decided to replace my two-barrel carburetor with a Holley four-barrel. Not wanting to spend a lot of time and money, I refurbished a used intake manifold for my '66 289. I didn't want to hassle with the mess and engine degreaser. I also didn't have access to a dip tank. So, I first used a putty knife to scrape off heavy grime and gasket material. Then I tried *Easy-Off* oven cleaner. With two applications and very minimal wire brushing and rinses, I was down to the bare metal in no time. With additional applications of aerosol paint stripper, I had a completely clean intake manifold. The entire operation took about 45 minutes. Now I keep a can of oven cleaner in my auto supplies.

Better Ideas

While restoring my Mustang's interior, I noticed the lack of a non-flammable safety barrier between the passenger compartment and the fuel tank. For added safety, I removed the original fiberboard panel and took it to a sheet metal shop for use as a template for cutting a sheet metal equivalent of the fiberboard original. I reinstalled the fiberboard panel, and then, with self-tapping sheel metal screws, I installed the sheet metal separator. For less than \$25, you and your occupants can have greater protection from accidental fuel tank rupture and ignition, but with no visible modifications.

Better Idea Of The Month



Even with a new hood to firewall seal, rainwater manages to seep into the engine compartment and settle at the lowest point in the shock tower braces. This promotes rust. This can be solved on the non-concours street driver by simply drilling a tiny drain hole (about 1/16-inch) through the brace at the point where the water usually sits. There's no real need to remove the braces for drilling, just be careful not to hit the shock tower.
